Given that autism can be reliably diagnosed by experienced clinicians by the age of 2 years [19], and that parents typically express concern about their child's development as early as 12 months of age [20 – 22], it is astonishing that the average age of diagnosis in the US continues to be well over 4½ years [23].

Assessment of Autism Across the Lifespan: A Way Forward ...

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Gillberg and Steffenberg (1987) found that 35 percent of a sample of 23 people (16-23 years) with ASD experienced 1–2 year periods of aggravation of behavioral symptoms (e.g., aggression, hyperactivity, insistence on sameness) and 22 percent exhibited continuing deterioration throughout puberty.

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
