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State your thesis / claim—compose a sentence or two stating the position you will support with logos (sound reasoning: induction, deduction), pathos (balanced emotional appeal), and ethos (author credibility).

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First, introduce your topic. The introductory paragraph(s) should briefly orient the reader to the topic and provide a conceptual map of the rest of the paper. Second, provide a thesis statement. Your thesis statement is the main point of your paper and should address the paper topic assigned by your instructor.

Constructing an argument. When writing an essay it is essential to construct an argument. An argument is a particular stand on an issue or question. It is made up of a series of claims. There are two

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types of claim: the conclusion: the final claim that you are trying to prove. This is often the answer to a direct question, and is also known as the thesis statement.

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Constructing an Argument. Your preliminary reading and literature review should provide you with a general sense of a potential argument. At this stage you need to express as precisely as you can what your argument is. It is useful to identify four main points to explore that will support your argument.

Consider your conclusion or claim and the premises of your argument and imagine someone who denies each of them. For example, if you argued, "Cats make the best pets. This is because they are clean and independent," you might imagine someone saying, "Cats do not make the best

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pets. They are dirty and needy.”.

Broadly speaking, the construction of scholarly argument can be divided into two principle components: affirmation and refutation. Whereas the former asserts a certain point (i.e. "this is so"), the latter

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disputes a certain point (i.e. "this is not so"). In deconstructing an argument we are taking apart a counter-view and are accordingly concerned with refutation.

1. Select an arguable topic, preferably one which interests, puzzles, or appeals to you. Make sure your

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topic is neither too broad--something which warrants a dissertation--nor too limited. Decide what your goals are for the paper.
