□ Determine and implement the overall care plan/wound treatment plan: The overall care plan addresses the client concerns, environment and system issues, risks/causative factors and indicates the treatment plan for local wound care interventions.

### Guideline: Wound Management for Adults & Children

1. First aid should be administered at the work site, if microbial contamination of the wound is a possibility or if the injury involves a chemical exposure. 2. If the clinician is not confident that the first aid was consistent with the approach described below, wound care is provided in OMS.

### Clinical Tools - Wound, Ostomy and Continence Nurses ...

The National Institute for Health and Care Excellence recommends that sterile normal saline is used for cleansing surgical wounds during the first 48 hours after surgery (NICE, 2013). Once the incision site has healed and the wound is no longer open, there should be no need to cleanse the wound.

### Nursing Assessment and Management for Skin and Wound Care ...

The tissue edges of the wound knit together 48 hours after surgery but have little tensile strength and require continued support from sutures, staples or clips until full epithelialisation takes place. Wounds healing by secondary intention require dressings which are suited to the size, depth, position and level of exudates.

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
